CITY COUNCIL & ADMINISTRATION

- Mayor Evans presented a proclamation to the R.E.A.D. (Reading Encourages Advanced Development) Literacy Program and proclaimed February 1-8 as Literacy Week in Livingston.
- At the March 14, 2017 Council Meeting, the City Council appointed Chief of Police Dennis Clifton as Interim City Manager following the passing of City Manager Marilyn Sutton.
- The City Secretary furnished a Certificate of Unopposed Candidates confirming that Alderwoman Cochran, Alderman Luna and Alderman Davis were unopposed for election to office for the election to be held on May 6, 2017. Council approved Ordinance No. A-800 cancelling the May 6, 2017 General Election and declaring each unopposed candidate elected to office.
- Alderwoman Elgin Davis was reappointed to serve on the Deep East Texas Council of Governments Board of Directors for the term 7/1/17 - 6/30/18.
- Council approved the payment of \$4,200.00 as the City of Livingston's pro-rata share of the annual funding of the Brazos Transit District service.
- In April, Council appointed Patricia Crawford as the City of Livingston Finance Director and Julie Miller was promoted to Utility Billing Supervisor.
- At the special-called May 16, 2017 Council meeting, the City Secretary administered oaths of office and presented Certificates of Election to Alderwoman Judy Cochran, Alderman Elgin

Davis and Alderman Raymond Luna. Alderwoman Cochran was nominated to serve as Mayor Pro-tem for the 2017-2018 term.


- Council presented Certificates of Appreciation to 12 local churches for their participation in the fifth annual RISE UP! Day of Service. Coordinated by First Baptist Church, this tremendous event included over 1,000 participants giving of their time and talents to provide community service project assistance to the City of Livingston as well as numerous school districts and non-profit service organizations in the area.
- Mayor Evans presented a Memorial Day Proclamation at the American Legion Post #312 Memorial Day Ceremony.
- In June, Council approved a request for authorization to execute a professional services contract with Ray Associates, Inc. to conduct an executive search for City Manager.
- Mayor Evans issued an Emergency Declaration in advance of Hurricane Harvey as crews prepared for the impending heavy rain and possibility of flooding.
- In September, Council accepted the resignation of Alderman Billy S. Wiggins and appointed Marion 'Bid' Smith for the remainder of the 2016 - 2018 term.

- Effective October 1, 2017, Billy S. Wiggins was appointed as City Manager of the City of Livingston. Mayor Evans presented a Resolution of Appreciation to Mr. Wiggins for his service as Alderman.
- Council appointed Ellie Monteaux as Assistant City Manager effective October 1, 2017.
- Mayor Evans presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Chief of Police Dennis Clifton for his distinguished service as Interim City Manager.



FINANCE DEPARTMENT

The City was awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association for its 2016 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. This is the 29th consecutive year the City has earned this prestigious national award.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

- Escorted and assisted with traffic control for several parades and events throughout the year including the Dunbar Alumni Association Parade, the Spirit Ride bicycle event, the Jingle Bell Fun Run/Walk and the annual lighted Christmas Parade.
- In April, Livingston Police Department participated in the Goodrich I.S.D. Career Day.
- July 21, 2017 Officer Tito Reyes and Officer Brandon Brewer presented a public safety program to the youth and parents at the Fellowship Ministries Church Vacation Bible School.
- The City Council approved a resolution authorizing the submission of a Rifle-Resistant Body Armor Grant Program application to the State of Texas Office of the Governor, Criminal Justice Division. The Livingston Police Department was awarded the grant in the amount of \$10,431.
- The Livingston Police Department presented seven graduating seniors with the Caran Coward Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship funds were raised by department employees at the annual barbecue lunch.
- The Livingston Police Department presented public safety programs to various civic organizations.
- The Police Department, Fire Department, and Public Works coordinated with other agencies to ensure the safety of the public throughout the flooding brought on from Hurricane Harvey, as well as during the disaster recovery.
- The Livingston Police Department celebrated National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week in April, and expressed appreciation for the dedication and professionalism of the department's personnel.
- Attended training throughout the year including legal update training and intermediate Spanish.
- Partnered with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Tackle Addict and Walmart for the third annual "Shop with a Cop" event where several local children were treated to breakfast with the officers before going on a shopping spree.

- The Livingston Volunteer Fire Department provides Livingston and the surrounding area with fire prevention, fire protection, medical first responders, rescue operations and hazardous material responses. The Department covers 250 square miles of property in its initial response area. The Department also provides mutual aid to the other ten departments in Polk County. In 2017, the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department responded to 587 calls for service, including 268 inside the City and 319 outside the City.
- In February, the Department held its annual fire training school, attended by over 400 students and instructors from over 95 different fire departments throughout Texas.
- The City Council approved the renewal of the annual agreement with Polk County for firefighting services to be provided by the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department outside the City limits from October 1, 2017 through September 30, 2018, reflecting funding of \$41,313.82 by the County.
- Throughout the year, members of the Department attended training at various locations to meet their continuing education requirements; the Department also provided fire prevention and fire safety programs to schools, civic groups and organizations.



LIVINGSTON MUNICIPAL LIBRARY



- Livingston Municipal Library offered exciting educational events throughout 2017 including 204 programs for children, 66 adult programs and 63 young adult programs.
- The Friends of the Library provided funds to purchase large print books, children's books and the Houston Chronicle as well as \$1,500 to allow the library to continue membership with the Piney Woods Digital Consortium. The Friends of the Library also provided prizes for the summer reading program and funds for special programs.
- The 'Build A Better World' summer reading program provided programs for children, including Storytime for preschoolers, Toddler Time for infants and toddlers, and Baby and Me lap sit program. The library hosted a teen winter reading series in January and weekly teen activities throughout the year.
- The Library hosted two events from the Houston Museum of Natural Science – the 'Renewable is Doable!' green energy program and the 'Think Big! Build It Big!' construction program.
- The second annual Family Fun Day at Pedigo Park was held in June. Livingston ISD coaches introduced different sports and refreshments were served by the Pilot Club.

- Library Clerk Nita Kuehn retired from the City of Livingston after serving over 36 years in the library.
- The three community meeting rooms were utilized throughout the year to provide informational programs from numerous civic groups and area agencies. Classes held at the Library included diabetes education, quilting, crochet, sewing and beginner's drawing.
- The Library received the Libraries & Literacy Grant from the Texas State Library to purchase a new laptop computer to provide digital literacy and job training skills to adults. The first training session topic covered writing an effective resume.
- During Hometown Christmas, the Library presented Kim Lehman, a storyteller and musician, who entertained with fun-filled songs, stories, and puppets.
- During 2017 a total of 62,012 customers entered the library. Of that number approximately 3,000 came in when the library acted as a county-wide Disaster Relief Center following Hurricane Harvey.

LIVINGSTON MAIN STREET



- Livingston Main Street continues to help revitalize downtown Livingston. Main Street has distributed nearly \$200,000 in reimbursement grant funds to downtown business and building owners since 2005. All of this money has been raised by local fundraisers. The program receives no federal or state financial assistance.
- Members of the Main Street Advisory Board are Julie Mayes Hambrick, Tammi Ogletree, Jeremy Buie, Debbie Cooper, Kevan Wood, Molly Anderson, Kim Brown, Jim Wright and Jennifer Birdwell.
- Main Street partnered with the F.A.I.T.H Military Support Group for the 6th annual Independence Day "Picnic in the Park." Live music, a car and motorcycle show, hot dogs provided by our local Sonic, and watermelon provided by the Polk County Welfare Board made this a memorable 4th of July celebration. A patriotic bicycle parade and children's activities were a part of the celebration. The event was held downtown in Anniversary Park.



- Main Street joined with all City departments to host Hometown Christmas. An estimated 10,000 people visited the downtown area to watch the Jingle Bell Fun Run and shop for food and gifts from vendors located along Jackson Street. Main Street oversees the vendor spaces and also provided space for the Livingston Quilt Club and Livingston Art League to display their creations. The lighted parade and visits with Santa ended a day of fun.
- Main Street works with the Polk County Museum, the Polk County Historical Commission and the Historical Society in sharing newly found historical information and historic photographs.
- Main Street is a member of the Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild, an organization comprised of local, independent businesses who promote the Livingston area. During 2017, the Guild produced and distributed 140,000 brochures across the state.

ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT

- Maintained lighting and electrical equipment at Livingston Municipal Complex, Livingston Municipal Airport, tennis courts, baseball fields, Livingston Municipal Library, Barney Wiggins Memorial Arena Fairgrounds, Matthews Street Park and fire training field. Maintained street lights, night lights and flood lights throughout the City.
- Assisted in the Electrical Safety Training at the Annual Livingston Volunteer Fire Department Fire School.
- Continued maintenance of rights-of-way throughout the City including mowing of vegetation, tree trimming and removal of dead or problem trees.
- Performed routine maintenance of both Livingston and Ogletree electric substations. Sam Rayburn Municipal Power Agency replaced the first of two substation transformers at the Livingston substation.
- Assisted with installation of Christmas lighted displays in Pedigo Park and Anniversary Park, the lighted chandelier at the intersection of Polk and Jackson and the pine cone pole decoration at Milam and Jackson. Three spans of primary and one span of underground secondary were installed at Pedigo Park to serve the new lighted display at the back pond.
- Electric linemen participated in six safety meetings hosted by Texas Electric Cooperatives.
- Installed new service and metering equipment to serve Best Stop Convenience Store on East Church, Grease Monkey on Highway 59 Bypass, and Polk County Senior Citizens Center on East Abbey.
- C.M. Joslin completed tree trimming along the electric distribution lines in the northwest section of the City.
- Installed seasonal Welcome to Livingston banners and military appreciation banners throughout the year.



PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT



STREET DEPARTMENT

- Ditch maintenance and drainage improvements were made throughout the city.
- Sign maintenance and improvements were made throughout the city.
- Continued the brush collection program picking up vegetative debris and brush once a month in each quadrant of the city.
- Purchased a sand spreader to maintain safer roads during icy conditions.
- Purchased a 6-yard dump truck.
- Completed renovation of Municipal Complex retaining walls and landscaping.

GARAGE DEPARTMENT

- Maintained 33 generators that supply electricity to various city facilities during power outages.
- Maintained and repaired more than 135 pieces of equipment/vehicles used by all city departments.
- Maintained fuel supply and fuel operations at Livingston Municipal Airport.
- Fabricated specialty tools for all city departments.
- Installed emergency lighting, radios and other equipment in new service vehicles.

WATER AND WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT

- The exterior and interior renovation project of the 500,000 gallon elevated water storage tank located on Jackson Street was completed.
- Construction was completed on the Trinity River Authority expansion of the City's water treatment plant on FM 350 South. The expansion increased daily water production from 3 MGD to 5 MGD to meet increased water supply needs in the community.
- Continued with fire hydrant maintenance and replacement throughout town.
- Continued with upgrades to the water distribution system in various parts of town.
- Continued sewer manhole rehabilitation lining approximately 17 manholes during the year.
- Installation of 8" water line on Old Woodville Road.

SPECIAL EVENTS / TRADE DAYS




- Trade Days completed its 18th year of operation with an average of 150 vendors attending each monthly event. Advertising efforts attracted vendors from as close as our hometown of Livingston to as far away as Wisconsin, Utah, South Dakota, Montana, Arizona, Illinois, California, Minnesota and Iowa. Zip code information collected from shoppers showed visitors from Minnesota, Arkansas, Missouri, Montana, North Carolina, Wisconsin, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Florida, South Dakota, Ohio and all areas of Texas.
- Construction began on the new office located at the Pedigo Park entrance. Upon completion of the new facility, Trade Days, Parks and Recreation, and Livingston Main Street will operate from this office. The former office building was relocated within Pedigo Park and will continue to be in use.
- Trade Days special events included the 16th Annual Spring Outdoor Expo in March and the Texas Pioneer Bird Show in May. Trade Days hosted the annual Hot Dog Supper for vendors in August and the Thanksgiving Potluck Dinner for vendors in November.
- The City's 18th annual Easter Eggstravaganza included 20,000 Easter eggs stuffed with candy and prize numbers and hid at Pedigo Park for local youngsters to hunt. Local businesses donated candy, bicycles, tricycles, swimming pools, sports equipment, Easter baskets, stuffed animals, electronic toys, learning games and much more. Over 200 prizes were given away at his event. Generous sponsors and numerous volunteers make this event one of the highlights of the year.

- This year, the Texas Game Warden Association, C.H. Marine, First National Bank, First State Bank and the City of Livingston sponsored the annual Kids Fishing Frenzie held in Pedigo Park. The fishing tournament is for children from toddlers to 16 years old to promote an interest in fishing. The Texas Game Wardens Association stocked the pond with catfish to be sure there were plenty of fish for the youngsters to catch.
- The 16th Annual Volunteer Appreciation Dinner was held in April with the theme "Thank You Berry Much!" Without its volunteers, the City of Livingston would be unable to host the many special events and youth sports leagues throughout the year.
- The annual Hometown Christmas celebration attracted many visitors. The Jingle Bell Fun Run included over 350 walkers and runners, many in costume. The Train Village was popular throughout the month of December. The Hometown Christmas event concluded with a lighted evening parade with nearly 70 parade entries. After the parade, Santa was at City Hall to visit with children and have pictures taken.



PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT



- Pedigo Park was the site for several community events, including the Polk County Relay for Life, First Baptist Church "A Night In Bethlehem" and the Christmas Hay Ride in the Park.
- The 72nd Annual Trinity-Neches Livestock Show & Rodeo was held at the Barney Wiggins Memorial Rodeo Arena in March and included 4-H and FFA youth exhibitors from Livingston and Polk County. Events included a BBQ cook-off, livestock show, washer tournament, arts & crafts exhibits, food show, ag mechanics exhibits, horticulture exhibits, sweetheart contest, rodeo and livestock auction.
- Matthews Park Swimming Pool offered a summer full of activities including swimming lessons for over 389 children, including Water Babies, Water Waddles for 3-year-olds and regular swim lessons for children 4 years old and older.
- The 57th Annual Polk County Youth Rodeo was held at the Barney Wiggins Memorial Rodeo Arena in July.
- The Parks and Recreation Department created a wide array of special Christmas lighting throughout the City including a new steamboat and port located in Pedigo Park.
- Numerous tournaments were hosted by Livingston Youth Baseball Association and Livingston Girls Softball Association bringing in many families to spend the weekend in Livingston.
- In its second year of operation by Bobby Brame, the Livingston Municipal Golf Course continued to offer nine challenging holes with three tee options and programs for men, women and children.
