# A MESSAGE FROM OUR MAYOR

Dear Fellow Citizens:

As Mayor of the City of Livingston, it is my pleasure to present the 2020 Annual Report to the Citizens of Livingston which recaps important projects, events, and activities in the City. It has been a most interesting year.

Following the retirement of Dennis Clifton, our long-time serving Police Chief, we swore in Matt Parrish as our new Police Chief. He later named Marty Drake as his Lieutenant and Kaleb Barker as Detective.

The city once again received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial reporting for the 2019 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. This is the 32nd consecutive year the city has earned this prestigious national award. The city is financially sound, and we have managed this without implementing an ad valorem tax. Our City Secretary, Ellie Monteaux was awarded the Municipal Clerk's Office Achievement of Excellence Award presented by the Texas Municipal Clerk's Association.

We are working toward cleaning up our city of dilapidated buildings. Our Code Enforcement department is working diligently on cleaning up junked vehicles and dilapidated buildings. We have had numerous public hearings declaring buildings to be unsafe and demolished or brought up to code.

We also saw several new businesses come to our town such as a new Jack in the Box, and a new Senior Living place to be completed in 2021, with more in the works and the downtown area saw Alma's Whistlestop Café open to the delight of many of their customers.

Amongst all of this, we prepared for Hurricane Laura, which fortunately missed us and we also suffered the effects of COVID-19. We closed our lobby but we were able to conduct all city business and serve our customers through the drive through while working with a rotating staff. In April, Onalaska suffered the wrath of a tornado and our city crews were there immediately providing assistance in any way possible.

Our city staff continues to do a great job promoting the city while also handling our daily obligations and providing excellent customer service. A special thanks to the many volunteers who work tirelessly providing programming and maintenance for our youth organizations. Many volunteers assist with special events which draws many visitors to our city. Our city employees are very dedicated and work tirelessly to make Livingston a great place to call home and our City Council serves without compensation. We are blessed, indeed!

# CITY COUNCIL & ADMINISTRATION

At the January meeting, City Council adopted Resolution No. 577 approving the terms of a 50-year raw water supply contract between the Trinity River Authority of Texas and the City, including the raw water amount of 3.0 MGD (million gallons per day) and reserve amount of 4.5 MGD, for a total of 7.5 MGD. The original raw water supply contract, which started in 1978, expired in February 2020.

Following a Public Hearing on February 11, 2020, City Council approved Ordinance No. A-818 adopting the 2019 Amendment to the Water Conservation and Emergency Water Management Plan.

On February 20, 2020, City Council met in special session and approved the 2020 Basic Emergency Management Plan for Polk and Trinity Counties, a plan that outlines the local approach to emergency operations and general guidance for emergency management activities.

The City Secretary furnished Certification of Unopposed Candidates confirming that Mayor Judy Cochran, Alderman Alan Cook and Alderman Bid Smith were unopposed for election to office for the election to be held on May 2, 2020. Council approved Ordinance No. A-820 cancelling the May 2, 2020 General Election and declaring each unopposed candidate elected to office.

Mayor Cochran issued a Declaration of Local Disaster for Public Health Emergency on March 20, 2020 regarding the coronavirus/COVID19 pandemic. In special session on March 27, 2020, City Council approved Resolution No. 583 continuing and renewing the Disaster Declaration. City Manager Bill Wiggins provided Council with an update of the continued efforts of City personnel to reduce the spread of the pandemic.

In special session on April 24, 2020, City Council approved Resolution No. 584 which continued and renewed Mayor Cochran's March 20, 2020 Disaster Declaration of Local Disaster for Public Health Emergency regarding the coronavirus/COVID19 pandemic.

At the May 12, 2020 Council meeting, the City Secretary administered oaths of office and presented Certificates of Election to Mayor Judy Cochran, Alderman Alan Cook and Alderman Bid Smith. Alderman Cook was nominated to serve as Mayor Pro-tem for the 2020-2021 term.

City Secretary/Assistant City Manager Ellie Monteaux was awarded the Municipal Clerk's Office Achievement of Excellence Award by the Texas Municipal Clerks Association, one of only 18 recipients state-wide.

Alderman Elgin Davis was reappointed to serve on the Deep East Texas Council of Governments Board of Directors for the term 7/1/20 - 6/30/21.

Council approved the payment of \$4,200.00 as the City of Livingston's pro-rata share of the annual funding of the Brazos Transit District service.

Mayor Judy Cochran was reappointed to serve on the Board of Directors of the Sam Rayburn Municipal Power Agency for the 2020-2022 term.

Council appointed Aidney Reeves to represent the City of Livingston on the Lower Trinity Groundwater Conservations District Board for the 2021-2023 term.

Mayor Pro-tem Alan Cook issued a Certificate of Remembrance to be presented to the family of Joyce Rash, former Livingston City Secretary. Joyce served the citizens of Livingston for over 29 years and retired on January 31, 1985.





# LIVINGSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

Livingston Chief of Police Dennis Clifton retired January 31, 2020 after over 31 years of service. A retirement reception was held on January 14, 2020 and attended by his family and friends from across the state of Texas. Congratulations on your retirement, Chief Clifton, and THANK YOU for continuing to serve as a reserve officer for Livingston Police Department.

Matt Parrish was sworn in as the City of Livingston Chief of Police, the 10th person to hold this office since its creation in 1941. Chief Parrish has served the citizens of Livingston since 1992 and was promoted from the position of Lieutenant. Congratulations, Chief Parrish!

Officer Kevin Blackburn presented six graduating seniors with the Caran Coward Memorial Scholarship, each in the amount of \$1,000. The scholarship funds were raised by department employees at the annual barbecue lunch.

The Livingston Police Department celebrated National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week in April and expressed appreciation for the dedication and professionalism of the department's personnel.

# LIVINGSTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Livingston Volunteer Fire Department provides Livingston and the surrounding area with fire prevention, fire protection, medical first responders, rescue operations and hazardous material responses. The Department covers 250 square miles of property in its initial response area. The Department also provides mutual aid to the other ten departments in Polk County. In 2020, the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department responded to 633 calls for service, including 291 inside the City and 342 outside the City.

The City Council approved the renewal of the annual agreement with Polk County for firefighting services to be provided by the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department outside the City limits from October 1, 2020 through September 30, 2021, reflecting funding of \$41,313.82 by the County.

In February, the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department hosted the Livingston Area Fire School at the LVFD fire training field. The 2-day training event was attended by approximately 400 students representing over 50 fire departments from across Texas.

The Department also presented fire prevention and fire safety programs to approximately 1,850 students at schools throughout Polk county, in accordance with COVID guidelines.

# ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT

Maintained lighting and electrical equipment at Livingston Municipal Complex, Livingston Municipal Airport, tennis courts, baseball fields, Livingston Municipal Library, Barney Wiggins Memorial Arena Fairgrounds, Matthews Street Park, LVFD fire training field and four LVFD fire stations. Maintained street lights, night lights and flood lights throughout the City.

Continued maintenance of rights-of-way throughout the City including mowing of vegetation, tree trimming and removal of dead or problem trees.

Performed routine maintenance of both Livingston and Oglethorpe electric substations.

Completed an underground line extension on West Park Drive that completed an underground loop and utilizes a three-phase padmount switch. The line extension also serves the Livingston Village Apartments, an 80-unit development.

Assisted with installation of Christmas lighted displays in Pedigo Park and Anniversary Park.

Maintained 3,360 feet of LED lights that outline the buildings in the Main Street district during the holiday season.

Electric linemen participated in six safety meetings hosted by Texas Electric Cooperatives.

Installed seasonal Welcome to Livingston banners and military appreciation banners throughout the year.

Assisted other cities in disaster recovery following Hurricane Laura. Linemen Jamie Valderez and Dawson Roessler assisted the City of Jasper with electrical service restoration and Lineman Scott Langston delivered a transformer rack to Windfield, Louisiana.

Electric Lineworker Bud Farrar retired on September 30, 2020 after 12 years of service.

Continued routine line maintenance including changing out of utility poles and anchors.



# PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

## STREET DEPARTMENT

- Continued the brush collection program picking up vegetative debris and brush once a month in each quadrant of the city.
- Ditch maintenance and drainage improvements were made throughout the city.
- Sign maintenance and signage improvements were made throughout the city.
- Rehabilitated approximately 12,000 square yards of streets including stabilization, curb work and a 2-course seal coat. Rehabilitated 2,000 square yards of West Park Drive with concrete.

## GARAGE DEPARTMENT

- Maintained 36 generators that supply electricity to various city facilities during power outages.
- Maintained and repaired more than 135 pieces of equipment/vehicles used by all city departments.
- Maintained fuel supply for all departments and fuel operations at Livingston Municipal Airport.
- Installed emergency lighting, radios and other equipment in new service vehicles.

## WATER AND WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT

- Maguire Iron, Inc. continued construction of the 150,000-gallon elevated water storage tank located at West Street and the 400,000-gallon elevated water storage tank located at Walnut Street. Construction neared completion at the end of 2020.
- The Community Development Block Grant for the Sewer Improvements Project for the Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition System (SCADA) to be installed on sewer lift stations throughout the City was completed. TraC-n-trol, Inc. was the successful bidder on the project and installed the sewer SCADA system.
- Continued with fire hydrant maintenance and replacement throughout town.
- Continued with upgrades to the water distribution system in various parts of town.
- Continued sewer manhole rehabilitation on various manholes during the year.



# SPECIAL EVENTS / TRADE DAYS / PARKS & RECREATION

## SPECIAL EVENTS / TRADE DAYS

Trade Days completed its 21st year of operation. During 2020 the quarterly Trade Days event was held in March, October and November. The May event was cancelled due to the 'Stay At Home' mandate issued in response to the coronavirus/COVID19 pandemic.

In July the annual Kids Fishing Frenzie returned to Pedigo Park. With social distancing guidelines and coronavirus/COVID19 protocols in place, the fishing tournament was a success. Thanks to generous sponsors, the pond was stocked with fish and a number of the fish were tagged for cash prizes. The City of Livingston joined with the Texas Game Warden Association and the following sponsors for the event: Alabama Coushatta Tribal Council, Direct Solutions, First National Bank, First State Bank, Livingston Physical Therapy, Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild, LivCom, Sam Houston Electric, C&H Marina, McWilliams & Sons, Peters Tractor, Lyons A/C, Dr. Tiffany Jones Lee and The Plumber. Goody bags, trophies and prizes were awarded.

The Polk County Garden Club hosted the 'Letters to Santa' event on Saturday, December 12th at Miss Effie's Cottage. Following CDC guidelines regarding the coronavirus/COVID19 pandemic, children delivered their letter to Santa's mailbox and took a socially-distanced photo with Santa. Packaged cookies and drinks were provided by the City of Livingston and handed out by Garden Club members.

## PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT

With social distancing requirements and CDC guidelines in place, Pedigo Park was a great outdoor venue for the Livingston-Polk County Chamber of Commerce 1st Annual Smoke in the Pines BBQ Cookoff event.

The annual Trinity-Neches Livestock Show & Rodeo was cancelled for 2020. Organizers are planning for the 75th event to be held in 2021 at the Barney Wiggins Memorial Rodeo Arena. The week-long event will include 4-H and FFA youth exhibitors from Livingston and Polk county.

Matthews Park Swimming Pool opened to the public on Memorial Day. Swimming lessons were held for over 300 children, including Water Babies, Water Waddles for 3-year-olds, an adult swim lesson class and regular swim lessons for children 4 years old and older. Matthews Park Swimming Pool is home to the Livingston Sea Lions swim team whose 2020 season was cancelled due to the COVID19 pandemic.

The Parks and Recreation Department created a wide array of special Christmas lighting throughout the City. The drive-thru Christmas light display at Pedigo Park and the First Baptist Church 'Drive Through Bethlehem' event were the highlights of the Christmas season.



# LIVINGSTON MUNICIPAL LIBRARY

Livingston Municipal Library is located at the corner of Tyler and Milam Streets. The library closed for two weeks in January to conduct its biennial inventory. In response to the coronavirus/COVID19 pandemic, the library closed at noon on March 17th and reopened on May 1st with reduced capacity. The second floor and the lobby area were closed to customers and customers were limited to 30 minutes per day in the library.

Livingston Municipal Library hosted 70 programs for children, 3 adult programs and 6 young adult programs. These educational programs were attended by 1,254 people. Among the programs presented in 2020 were two crafting workshops for adults and two spring break activities for children. During the fall, children's programs included a Slime Lab and Book or Treat in October and a 'Christmas Cards for Soldiers' crafting program, with the library partnering with FAITH Military Support group in November.

The Friends of the Library provided funds to purchase large print books, children's books, and the Houston Chronicle. They also contributed \$1,500 to allow the library to continue membership with the Piney Woods Digital Consortium, through which the library provides access to eBooks and downloadable audiobooks and movies. Many board members volunteered their services to the library before the library closed in March.

# LIVINGSTON MAIN STREET

The Livingston Main Street Program envisions historical downtown Livingston as the heart of the City – a place where social, economic and civic activities generate a welcoming environment for local citizens and visitors to enjoy.

Livingston Main Street continues to help revitalize downtown Livingston. Main Street has distributed nearly \$200,000 in reimbursement grant funds to downtown business and building owners since 2005. This funding has been raised by local efforts.

Members of the Main Street Advisory Board are Molly Anderson, Kim Brown, Jeremy Buie, Jessica Corwin, Julee Evans, Julie Mayes Hamrick, Joyce Knierim, Tammi Ogletree, and Whitney Van Hees.

Main Street partners with the Polk County Museum, the Polk County Historical Commission and the Historical Society in sharing historical information and historic photographs.

Main Street is a member of the Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild, an organization comprised of local, independent businesses who promote the Livingston area.

The City of Livingston and Livingston Main Street partnered with the Livingston Farmers Market Association for the Farmers Market in Anniversary Park. The Farmers Market began May 23rd and continued Saturday mornings until August 1st.

Main Street partnered with Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild to organize the month-long Shop Small campaign running from October 29th through November 29th. Seventeen local businesses participated with hundreds of participating customers. Prizes awarded included \$1,300 in Guild Gold Bucks (redeemable same as cash at any of the 17 participating businesses), \$225 in dining coupons and three gift baskets.
