A MESSAGE FROM OUR *Mayor*

Dear Fellow Citizens:

I am happy to present the 2023 Annual Report to the Citizens recapping some important projects along with events and activities that occurred within our city.

Our financial department has outdone itself again as we have received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for the 2022 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report. This is the 35th consecutive year that we have earned this prestigious national award. We are financially sound, and we are still doing this without implementing an ad valorem tax.

We have almost completed the process of replacing all of the water meters in our city. The new meters will report the usage directly to our city staff eliminating the need to manually read the meters and you will be able to monitor your usage. We will begin replacing the electric meters very soon.

We are grateful that new businesses are still finding their way to our city. Some of these include Stella's Bakery, The Vault Venue, Katie's Kitchen, On the Road convenience store and a suite of new office buildings constructed across from the Judicial Center on Abbey Street. Along with these, the new Memory Care Center is almost ready to open, and we still have additional apartments and new houses being built within the city to help us with our

housing shortage. I'm also pleased to announce that we now have charging stations for electric cars that will accommodate Tesla and other brands.

Our 2023 Hometown Christmas was very successful, in spite of the storms that moved through shortly before the parade began. We had lots of vendors requiring us to add more space. There were lots of people in town for all of the activities, including the Jingle Bell Fun Run, shopping and visiting. Our display of lighted features continues to grow with many of them being placed in Pedigo Park and all over town.

Our staff still provides excellent Customer service while promoting all of the programs that we have. We are very fortunate to have lots of volunteers who are ready and willing to assist with some of our events each year.

I am honored to serve as your Mayor alongside the City Council, the staff, and many volunteers. Our City Council serves many hours without compensation as they strive to make Livingston a better place to live. I am proud to live in Livingston - A Great Place to Call Home.

City Council & Administration

At the January meeting, Council approved the continued participation in the Alliance for I-69 Texas and the payment of annual dues in the amount of \$1,265.00.

The City of Livingston General Election was ordered to be held on May 6, 2023. Council approved Resolution No. 603 establishing election procedures and approved the interlocal agreement with the County of Polk for the use of election equipment and services.

Council approved the submission of an application for the 2023-2024 Texas Community Block Grant Program. Langford Community Management Services was appointed as the grant administrator and The Brannon Corporation was appointed as engineer on the grant project.

Appointment of Dana Williams as Municipal Court Judge was continued for the May 2023 to May 2025 term.

The canvass of the May 6, 2023 City of Livingston General Election was conducted and approved at the May 16, 2023 Council meeting. Resolution No. 607 was approved declaring the results of the General Election. The City Secretary administered oaths of office to incumbent Alderman Raymond Luna, incumbent Alderman Elgin Davis and newly-elected Alderman Bobby Jackson Sr. Mayor Cochran presented Certificates of Election to the newly elected aldermen. Alderman Alan Cook was nominated to serve as Mayor Pro-tem for the 2023-2024 term.

The contract for waste collection and disposal services was awarded to Piney Woods Sanitation with an effective date beginning August 1, 2023.

Council approved the annexation of 34.04 acres in the M.L. Choate Survey, Abstract No. 15 owned by Eternal Holdings, LLC.

Alderman Elgin Davis was reappointed to serve on the Deep East Texas Council of Governments Board of Directors for the 2023-2024 term.

Dr. Elias Kanaan was reappointed to serve as the City of Livingston Local Health Authority for the term July 1, 2023 through July 1, 2025.

At the August 15, 2023 Council meeting, Ordinance No. A-840 was approved by City Council regarding the City of Livingston's Texas Municipal Retirement System retirement eligibility and vesting including the authorization of twenty (20) year retirement eligibility and five (5) year vesting.

Council approved Ordinance No. A-842 amending Article II of Chapter 40 (Electric Service) of the City of Livingston Code of Ordinance reducing the electric rate for each customer classification.

Aidney Reeves was appointed by Council to serve as the City of Livingston representative on the Board of the Lower Trinity Groundwater Conservation District for the 2024-2026 term. Mr. Reeves has served as the City's representative since his initial appointment in 2005.

Council approved the payment of \$4,200.00 as the City of Livingston's pro-rata share of the annual funding of the Brazos Transit District service.

Former Mayor Clarke Evans was reappointed to serve on the Board of Directors of the Sam Rayburn Municipal Power Agency for the 2023-2025 term.

The Livingston ISD Creekside Elementary Student Council Leadership Team attended the December Council meeting. Students lead the pledges to start the meeting and performed holiday songs for the City Council.

At the December Council meeting a Public Hearing was held to receive public comment on changing the City of Livingston General Election date from the May uniform election date to the November uniform election date as authorized by the Texas Legislature's passage of Senate Bill 2258 amending Texas Election Code Section 41.0052. Following the public hearing and discussion, Council approved Resolution No. 521 changing the City's General Election date to the November uniform election date and providing for terms of office to be adjusted accordingly. As a result, the City of Livingston's next General Election will be held Tuesday, November 5, 2024.

Police Department

The Livingston Police Department worked with Livingston I.S.D. administration to upgrade security systems and response equipment at all LISD campuses. School Based Officers helped to organize the first annual 'Just One' event held at Livingston High School.

The Caran Coward Memorial Scholarship, each in the amount of \$2,000, was awarded to four graduating seniors.

The Livingston Police Department Honor Guard participated in several community events including the 9/11 Remembrance Ceremony held September 11, 2023 at City Hall.

Continued utilization of the FLOCK system to alert dispatch and officers of vehicles coming into the city that have been reported stolen and vehicles related to missing persons, amber alerts, etc. During 2023 the Livingston Police Department recovered 37 stolen vehicles and located 3 missing persons from FLOCK.

Livingston Police Department participated in the 13th annual 'Shop With A Cop' event at the Livingston Walmart. This event provided a Christmas shopping experience for local children. Special thanks to Store Manager Jonathan Montalvo, staff at Walmart, and generous sponsors for making this event possible.

During 2023, Livingston Police Department Officers and Telecommunicators responded to 15,265 calls for service with an average response time of 2 minutes and 45 seconds. Department personnel investigated 371 crashes, investigated 2,091 criminal offense reports, and made 747 arrests during the year.

In 2023 the Livingston Police Department received the following Department of Justice Grants: \$95,000 for ballistic shields to be placed in all vehicles; \$10,000 for upgraded equipment in patrol units; and \$25,000 for ballistic vests for all officers.

K-9 Officer Bear was added to the department from a 'K-9 For Cops' grant and private donations which upfitted the new K-9 vehicle.

All commissioned officers, telecommunications officers, evidence technician, and animal control officer received a total of 2,635 hours of continuing educational training throughout 2023.



LIVINGSTON VOLUNTEER

Fire Department

The Livingston Volunteer Fire Department provides Livingston and the surrounding area with fire prevention, fire protection, medical first responders, rescue operations and hazardous material responses. The Department covers 250 square miles of property in its initial response area. The Department also provides mutual aid to the other ten departments in Polk County.

In 2023, the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department responded to 910 calls for service, including 360 inside the City and 550 outside the City.

The City Council approved the renewal of the annual agreement with Polk County for firefighting services to be provided by the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department outside the City limits from October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024, reflecting funding of \$53,692.87 by the County.

The Livingston Fire Training school was hosted by the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department on February 24th and 25th with 434 participants from 64 departments.

The Department presented fire prevention and fire safety programs to approximately 2,500 students at schools throughout Polk county.

Electric

DEPARTMENT

Maintained lighting and electrical equipment at Livingston Municipal Complex, Livingston Municipal Airport, tennis courts, baseball fields, Livingston Municipal Library, Barney Wiggins Memorial Arena Fairgrounds, Matthews Street Park, LVFD fire training field and four LVFD fire stations. Maintained street lights, night lights and flood lights throughout the City.

At the February meeting, Council awarded the bid for annual inspections and maintenance of the Livingston substation and the Ogletree substation to Dashiell Corporation in the amount of \$44,110.00.

Continued maintenance of rights-of-way throughout the City including mowing of vegetation, tree trimming and removal of dead or problem trees.

Performed routine maintenance of both Livingston and Ogletree electric substations.

Assisted with installation of Christmas lighted displays in Pedigo Park and Anniversary Park. Maintained 3,360 feet of LED lights that outline the buildings in the Main Street district during the holiday season.

Installed seasonal Welcome to Livingston banners and military appreciation banners throughout the year.

Continued routine line maintenance including changing out of utility poles and anchors.



Public Works

Continued the brush collection program picking up vegetative debris and brush once a month in each quadrant of the city.

Ditch maintenance and drainage improvements were made throughout the city.

Sign maintenance and signage improvements were made throughout the city.

WATER AND WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT

Installation of water meters for the automatic metering infrastructure (AMI) project began in 2023. The AMI project will include the replacement of water and electric meters and will provide greater transparency to citizens regarding their water and electricity usage.

Continued with fire hydrant maintenance and replacement throughout town.

Continued with upgrades to the water distribution system in various parts of town.

Continued sewer manhole rehabilitation on various manholes during the year.

GARAGE DEPARTMENT

Maintained 36 generators that supply electricity to various city facilities during power outages.

Maintained and repaired more than 135 pieces of equipment/vehicles used by all city departments.

Maintained fuel supply for all departments. Fuel operations at Livingston Municipal Airport were taken out of service January 26, 2023 for replacement of the fuel tank and fueling system. Fuel service resumed in October.

Installed emergency lighting, radios and other equipment in new service vehicles.



Special Events/Trade Days/Parks & Recreation

Trade Days completed its 24th year of operation. During 2023 the quarterly Trade Days event was held in March, May, October and November.

The annual Easter Eggstravaganza was held at Pedigo Park on April 1st. Thanks to many generous sponsors, there were 20,000 candy-filled eggs and over 320 prizes given away.

Matthews Street Park Swimming Pool opened to the public on May 22nd. During the summer, 573 swimming lessons were given, including Water Babies, Water

Waddles for 3-year-olds and regular swim lessons for children 4 years old and older. Matthews Park Swimming Pool is home to the Livingston Sea Lions swim team.

Pedigo Park was an excellent outdoor venue for the 4th Annual Livingston-Polk County Chamber of Commerce Smoke in the Pines BBQ Cookoff event held in June. The Smokin' Hot Auto and Bike Show, Kids' Q event, and vendor booths added to the successful event.

The Polk County Garden Club hosted the 'Visit With Santa' event on Friday, December 8th at Miss Effie's

Cottage. Children delivered their letter to Santa's mailbox and took a photo with Santa. Packaged cookies and drinks were provided by the City of Livingston and handed out by Garden Club members.

The Parks and Recreation Department created a wide array of special Christmas lighting throughout the City. The drive-thru Christmas light display at Pedigo Park and the First Baptist Church 'Walk Through Bethlehem' event were favorites of the Christmas season.



LIVINGSTON

Main Street

The Livingston Main Street Program envisions historic downtown Livingston as the heart of the City – a place where social, economic and civic activities generate a welcoming environment for local citizens and visitors to enjoy.

Livingston Main Street was recognized by Main Street America and by Texas Main Street as a 2023 Accredited Program for attaining the prescribed standards of performance.


Main Street is a member of the Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild, an organization comprised of local, independent businesses who promote the Livingston area.

F.A.I.T.H. Military Support Group and Livingston Main Street hosted the July 4th Independence Day Picnic in Anniversary Park. The Farmers and Artisan Market were also held in Anniversary Park.

The "Where's Rufus the Elf?" scavenger hunt continued for the fourth year. Rufus moved to various locations in Livingston over a 2-week period and followers guessed his new location daily. Prizes were awarded to winners.

Main Street partnered with Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild to organize the month-long Shop Local campaign again for 2023. Numerous local businesses participated with hundreds of participating customers.

Main Street joined with all City departments to host Livingston Hometown Christmas 2023. The Jingle Bell Fun Run and Walk included 446 participants. Main Street organized 205 vendor spaces and provided space for the Livingston Quilt Club to display their creations. The lighted Christmas parade was the highlight of the event with 106 parade entries.



LIVINGSTON

Municipal Library

Livingston Municipal Library is located at the corner of Tyler and Milam Streets. During 2023 a total of 23,537 customers entered the library.

Livingston Municipal Library hosted 159 programs which were attended by 3,054 people.



The Friends of the Library continued to operate from their room on the second floor of the library. The Friends provided funds to purchase large print books, children's books, and the Houston Chronicle. They also contributed \$1,500 to allow the library to continue membership with the Piney Woods Digital Consortium, through which the library provides access to eBooks and downloadable audiobooks. The Friends also provided funds for special programs and for the summer reading program.
