Dear Fellow Citizens,

It is my pleasure to present this letter as an update on important projects and events that have occurred within our city during 2024.

We are happy to welcome the John Deer/King Ranch Ag & Turf facility to our city. Denny's is now open for business and welcoming crowds every day. The Courthouse restoration project is still ongoing as well as the 64-unit apartment complex on Hwy 190 East. Work at the Exceptional Emergency Room is ongoing as they convert to a specialty hospital and work at the Mason Jar is almost complete. There are 15 single-family homes being built throughout the city at this time.

In April, the Livingston Police Department held a Drug Take Back Day, where they would accept expired medications for proper disposal. They will still accept expired prescription drugs Monday thru Friday from 8:00 – 5:00. In August, we welcomed Texas State University System to Polk County. We are delighted to have this education center to provide an opportunity for our citizens to further their education, locally. In October, thanks to the Polk County Historical Commission, we held the dedication of a marker at the Old City Cemetery for Moses L. Choate, the founder of Livingston.

After much reconstruction, our Golf Course is open again under the management of Dustin Lowery. We also officially opened the new pickleball courts in Matthews Street Park, and we sponsored two (2) Clean Up days at Pedigo Park.

We had many activities going on in December as a part of our Hometown Christmas which was bigger than ever again last year. We have visitors from out of town that come every year to participate in our activities and see our beautiful lighted decorations.

Our staff still provides excellent customer service while promoting all of the programs that we provide. We are very fortunate to have lots of volunteers who are ready and willing to assist with some of our events each year. Our city is financially sound, with no debt and we do not have an ad valorem tax.

I am honored to continue serving as your Mayor alongside the City Council, the staff, and many volunteers. Our City Council serves many hours without compensation as they strive to make Livingston a better place to live. I am proud to live in Livingston – A Great Place to Call Home.

At the February meeting, Council awarded the contract for annual auditing services for the annual financial audit for fiscal year ending 9/30/2024 to Belt Harris Pechacek LLP. Sealed proposals were submitted and reviewed by a scoring committee on January 8, 2024, as outlined in the Request for Proposals that was published in November, 2023.

March 12, 2024, City Council approved Resolution No. 622 which authorized the advertisement for sealed competitive bids for the demolition of dilapidated structures located at 154 Banks Drive. The contract was awarded on October 8, 2024. Demolition of the dilapidated structures and cleanup of the property was completed in October.

A special called meeting of City Council was held on May 9, 2024 for presentation of a proposed resolution extending the Declaration of Local Disaster issued by Mayoral Proclamation on May 2, 2024 in response to widespread flooding. The Declaration of Local Disaster was extended a second time on June 7, 2024 by Resolution No. 627.

Ordinance No. A-846 was approved May 14, 2024 adopting the Water Conservation and Emergency Water Demand Management Plan for the City of Livingston as prepared by KSA Engineers.

As the City continued to recover from the historic flooding events that occurred in April and May of 2024, Hurricane Beryl was forecast to affect Livingston with severe weather, flooding, property damage, and dangerous conditions. Mayor Cochran issued a Disaster Declaration on July 7, 2024, in anticipation of Hurricane Beryl. Hurricane Beryl made landfall on Monday, July 8, 2024. The Declaration of Disaster was extended on July 9, 2024 for an additional 30 days.

At the July 9th regular meeting, the City Council approved the joint contract for election services with Polk County for the City's November 5, 2024 General Election. City Council approved Resolution No. 629 establishing election procedures for the purpose of election one (1) Mayor and two (2) Councilmembers. Filing of Applications for a Place

on the Ballot began on July 20th and continued through August 19, 2024.

The official City of Livingston Facebook page was launched on Wednesday, August 7, 2024 and is administered by City Secretary/Assistant City Manager Ellie Monteaux.

At the August 13, 2024 regular meeting, City Council approved a 5-year lease of the Livingston Municipal Golf Course to Dustin Lowery.

The Livingston-Polk County Chamber held a ribbon cutting on August 14, 2024, welcoming The Texas State University System Polk County Center to Livingston. The City of Livingston welcomes the affiliated colleges to Livingston – Lamar Institute of Technology, Lamar State College Orange, and Lamar State College Port Arthur.

The City of Livingston and the Polk County Historical Commission dedicated a new marker at the Old City Cemetery honoring Livingston's founder Moses L. Choate.

The celebration was held on Saturday, October 12, 2024, having been rescheduled from May 4th due to severe weather and flooding in Livingston.

Mayor Cochran presented a proclamation designating Tuesday, October 15, 2024 as Power of Pink Day in Livingston marking the 39th anniversary of the designation of October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

The canvass of the November 5, 2024 City of Livingston General Election was conducted and approved at the November 12, 2024 Council meeting. Resolution No. 632 was approved declaring the results of the General Election. The City Secretary administered oaths of office to incumbent Mayor Judy B. Cochran, incumbent Alderman Alan Cook, and newly-elected Alderman Andy Evans. Certificates of Election were presented. Alderman Alan Cook was nominated to serve as Mayor Pro-tem for the 2023-2024 term.

The Community Development Department conducted 310 inspections throughout 2024.

During 2024 the Community Development Department hosted Community Cleanup Events with the collection site at Pedigo Park.

The City of Livingston continued participation in the Polk County Economic Development Corporation. John Tarver, the City’s representative, maintained an office at the Livingston Municipal Library. Economic Development meetings were held throughout the year and attended by City Manager Bill Wiggins.

Police Department

The Caran Coward Memorial Scholarship was awarded to five local graduating seniors, each scholarship in the amount of \$2,000.

Continued utilization of the FLOCK system to alert dispatch and officers of vehicles coming into the city that have been reported stolen and vehicles related to missing persons, amber alerts, etc.

On Saturday, April 27th the Livingston Police Department participated in the 'Drug Take Back Day' sponsored by the Alcohol & Drug Awareness Council of Deep East Texas and Polk County Community In Action. Citizens were able to safely dispose of unused and expired medications by bringing them to the Livingston Police Department and two other locations within Polk County.

The department purchased an incinerator to dispose of seized drugs in compliance with DEA regulations.

During 2024, Livingston Police Department Officers and Telecommunicators responded to 13,580 calls for service with an average response time of 1 minute and 57 seconds. Department personnel investigated 376 crashes, investigated 1,287 criminal offense reports, and made 627 arrests during the year.

All commissioned officers, telecommunications officers, evidence technician, and animal control officer received a total of 1,621 hours of continuing educational training throughout 2024.



Livingston First Responders along with LISD Theatre arts students participated in the second annual Just One DWI Reenactment program at the Livingston High School parking lot. The "Just One" program is designed to educate students to the tragedies that can and too often do occur when individuals operate a motor vehicle under the influence (DWI).

Department officers and detectives provided 'Active Shooter' training and presentations to local businesses.

Police Department Officers and Mayor Judy Cochran gave Girl Scout Troop #101151 a tour of the Police Department, City Hall, and Municipal Court. Following the tour, the troop members were able to have a question and answer session with Mayor Cochran.

The department received a K9 for Cops grant placing K9 Hinu in Livingston I.S.D. schools.

Livingston Police Department participated in the 14th annual 'Shop With A Cop' event at the Livingston Walmart. This event provided a Christmas shopping experience for over 50 local children. Special thanks to Store Manager Jonathan Montalvo, staff at Walmart, and generous sponsors for making this event possible.

LIVINGSTON

Volunteer Fire Department



The Livingston Volunteer Fire Department provides Livingston and the surrounding area with fire prevention, fire protection, medical first responders, rescue operations and hazardous material responses. The Department covers over 250 square miles of property in its initial response area. The Department also provides mutual aid to the other ten departments in Polk County.

In 2024, the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department responded to 933 calls for service, including 432 inside the City and 501 outside the City.

The City Council approved the renewal of the annual agreement with Polk County for firefighting services to be provided by the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department outside the City limits from October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2025, reflecting funding of \$53,692.87 by the County.

The Livingston Fire Training school was hosted by the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department on February 23rd and 24th. Livingston Fire Chief Corky Cochran reported there were over 498 people involved in the training event including 331 students, 112 instructors, 5 TEEX instructors and more than 50 volunteers.

The Department presented fire prevention and fire safety programs to approximately 2,500 students at schools throughout Polk county.

Electric Department

Maintained lighting and electrical equipment at Livingston Municipal Complex, Livingston Municipal Airport, tennis courts, baseball fields, Livingston Municipal Library, Barney Wiggins Memorial Arena Fairgrounds, Matthews Street Park, LVFD fire training field and four LVFD fire stations. Maintained street lights, night lights and flood lights throughout the City.

Continued maintenance of rights-of-way throughout the City including mowing of vegetation, tree trimming and removal of dead or problem trees.

Performed routine maintenance of both Livingston and Ogletree electric substations.

Assisted with installation of Christmas lighted displays in Pedigo Park and Anniversary Park.

Maintained 3,360 feet of LED lights that outline the buildings in the Main Street district during the holiday season.

Installed seasonal Welcome to Livingston banners and military appreciation banners throughout the year.

Continued routine line maintenance including changing out of utility poles and anchors.

Continued the brush collection program picking up vegetative debris and brush once a month in each quadrant of the city.

Ditch maintenance and drainage improvements were made throughout the city.

Sign maintenance and signage improvements were made throughout the city.

WATER AND WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT

Continued with fire hydrant maintenance and replacement throughout town.

Continued with upgrades to the water distribution system in various parts of town.

Continued sewer manhole rehabilitation on various manholes during the year.

GARAGE DEPARTMENT

Maintained 36 generators that supply electricity to various city facilities during power outages.

Maintained and repaired more than 135 pieces of equipment/vehicles used by all city departments.

Installed emergency lighting, radios and other equipment in new service vehicles.

Special Events/Trade Days/Parks & Recreation



Trade Days completed its 25th year of operation. During 2024 the quarterly Trade Days event was held in March, October and November. The May Trade Days event was cancelled due to heavy rain, flooding and disaster recovery.

Pedigo Park was an excellent outdoor venue for the 5th Annual Livingston-Polk County Chamber of Commerce Smoke in the Pines BBQ Cookoff event held in June and the Drive Thru Trunk or Treat event held in October sponsored by the Polk County Peace Officers Association.

The annual Easter Eggstravaganza was held at Pedigo Park on March 23rd. Thanks to many generous sponsors, there were 20,000 candy-filled eggs and over 200 prizes given away.

Matthews Street Park Swimming Pool opened to the public on May 27th. During the summer, 470 swimming lessons were given, including Water Babies, Water Waddles for 3-year-olds and regular swim lessons for children 4 years old and older. Matthews Park Swimming Pool is home to the Livingston Sea Lions swim team.

The Kids Fishing Frenzie event returned to Pedigo Park in September with prizes, trophies, and fun for the whole family. The event was sponsored by the City of Livingston and the Texas Game Warden Association.

Matthews Street Park Pickleball Courts opened to the public on October 24th.

The Polk County Garden Club hosted the 'Visit With Santa' event on Friday, December 13th at Miss Effie's Cottage. Children delivered their letter to Santa's mailbox and took a photo with Santa. Packaged cookies and drinks were provided by the City of Livingston and handed out by Garden Club members.

The Parks and Recreation Department created a wide array of special Christmas lighting throughout the City. The drive-thru Christmas light display at Pedigo Park and the First Baptist Church 'Walk Through Bethlehem' event were favorites of the Christmas season.



LIVINGSTON

Main Street

The Livingston Main Street Program envisions historic downtown Livingston as the heart of the City – a place where social, economic and civic activities generate a welcoming environment for local citizens and visitors to enjoy.



Main Street is a member of the Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild, an organization comprised of local, independent businesses who promote the Livingston area. Main Street and the Guild presented the Christmas in July shopping event with 34 participating businesses.

F.A.I.T.H. Military Support Group and Livingston Main Street hosted the July 4th Independence Day Picnic in Anniversary Park.

The “Finding Rufus” scavenger hunt continued in 2024 and is now a family tradition for some. Rufus moved to various locations in Livingston over a 2-week period and followers guessed his new location daily. Prizes were awarded to winners.

Livingston Main Street presented the Broomsticks & Brews Sip and Shop event on Saturday, October 26. Participants were invited to scroll through the Main Street district in downtown Livingston and visit the eleven participating businesses.

Main Street partnered with Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild to organize the month-long Shop Local campaign again for 2024. Numerous local businesses participated with hundreds of participating customers.

Main Street joined with all City departments to host Livingston Hometown Christmas 2024. The Jingle Bell Fun Run and Walk included 445 participants. Main Street organized 205 vendor spaces and provided space for the Livingston Quilt Club to display their creations. The lighted Christmas parade was the highlight of the event with 92 parade entries.

LIVINGSTON

Municipal Library

Livingston Municipal Library is located at the corner of Tyler and Milam Streets. During 2024 a total of 17,427 customers entered the library.



The library hosted 29 programs throughout the year which were attended by 828 people. Programs included storyteller Elizabeth Ellis, Wildlife Biologist Chris Gregory, Family Game Day, Family Movie Day, an acrylic paint pouring class, and many more programs for patrons of all ages.

Beginning with disaster recovery from historic flooding events in May, the Library hosted FEMA in the meeting and conference rooms for four months. FEMA was onsite in Livingston during the devastation of Hurricane Beryl in July and worked from the library through the end of September.

The Friends of the Library continued to operate from their room on the second floor of the library. The Friends provided funds to purchase large print books, children's books, and the Houston Chronicle. They also contributed \$1,500 to allow the library to continue membership with the Piney Woods Digital Consortium, through which the library provides access to eBooks and downloadable audiobooks. The Friends also provided funds for special programs and for the summer reading program.

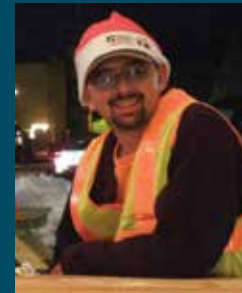
