Dear Fellow Citizens:

Once again it is my privilege to report to you on the operation of our City during the past year. As you will see in this report, the city moved forward in 2012 with various major capital improvement projects to meet the continuing growth in our community:

The construction of a 1,000,000 gallon elevated water storage tank on the west side of Livingston to accommodate the growth along US 190 West and FM 350 South.

The renovation of the Wadsworth facility on Tyler Street, which was purchased from First Baptist Church in late 2008, as a new 17,500 square foot library to include a large sitting area with Wi-Fi access and a vending area, an expanded public use computer room, a separate young adult area and children's area along with books and current materials, a staff workroom and librarian's office on the first floor. The second floor will include a genealogy library, additional space for children's activities, the Friends of the Library organization and community meeting rooms.

The Trinity River Authority's expansion of the city's water treatment plant on FM 350 South to increase production from 3 MGD to 5 MGD to meet increased water supply needs in the community.

The construction of an electric express feeder to connect the Livingston substation on the east side of the city with the Ogletree substation on the west side of the city for redundancy in electric operations within the city limits.

In my position as Mayor, I am able to meet with community organizations and individuals on a regular basis who demonstrate their willingness to serve our community in a variety of ways.

We are fortunate to have so many volunteers to work with us to ensure that Livingston remains "a great place to call home" for future generations. I continue to be grateful to our city employees, our management staff and to the members of our City Council for their selfless commitment and involvement.

It is my honor to serve as Mayor of this community.

Administrative and Utility Billing

- Accepted the donation of 11.475 acres of land for a future park site.
- Approved revisions to the Livingston Police Department Use of Force Policy to add the use of tasers as an additional level of force.
- Approved revisions to the Livingston Police Department Eyewitness Identification Policy as required by a legislative amendment to the Texas Code of Criminal Procedures.
- Authorized the issuance of \$6,000,000 in Certificates of Obligation to fund renovation of the Wadsworth building as a new library and to fund construction of a 1,000,000 gallon elevated water storage tank to be located on the west side of Livingston.
- Authorized the issuance of refunding bonds to save on the annual principal and interest payments on existing debt by taking advantage of current low interest rates.
- Repealed the regulation of emergency medical services within the city limits.
- Reappointed Ray Hill to serve on the Deep East Texas Council of Governments Board of Directors for the term July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013.
- Adopted a resolution supporting the existing US 59 corridor as the I-69 footprint within the City of Livingston.
- Approved the City's participation in the Transforming Texas Health Initiative by authorizing the Angelina County & Cities Health District assessment of Livingston's existing parks and recreational facilities and streets and sidewalks.
- Approved the use of Pedigo Park as a site for the Fit City Challenge events throughout the year with the City of Livingston as a sponsor.
- Approved the Construction Manager at Risk process for the new library and accepted the proposal of J.E. Kingham Construction Company.
- Approved the Livingston Emergency Center Master Plan and Preliminary Plat for the site at the intersection of US 59 and US 190 as a 24-hour emergency care center with other medical facilities to be added in Phase II.
- Accepted the resignation of Gaffney Phillips as City Attorney effective September 30, 2012 and appointed Jim Wright as City Attorney effective October 1, 2012.
- Adopted ordinances creating Drug Free Zones and Gang Free Zones within the City of Livingston.
- Hired an IT (information technology) consulting firm to assess and upgrade computer hardware, software and security issues for the utility billing, finance, police and municipal court operations.

Murphy Memorial Library



- 5,106 customers entered the library.
- 52,491 items were checked out.
- 1,376 reference questions were asked of library staff.
- 1,557 items were added to the collection.
- 707 new customers registered and 1,165 renewed their memberships.
- 6,298 hours of computer access to 6,527 customers were provided.
- 1,296 customers used the library's wireless access.
- The library received two Tocker Foundation grants, one to fund the new Integrated Library System for five years, and the second to update the Spanish and Bilingual collection.

- The Friends of the Library provided funds to purchase large print books, children's books, the Houston Chronicle and prizes for the Summer Reading Club. The Friends also provided \$1,500 to allow the library to join the Pineywoods Digital Consortium through which the library provides access to eBooks and downloadable audiobooks.
- The library provided programs for children, including Storytime for preschoolers, Toddler Time for infants and toddlers, and offsite Storytime and Toddler Time to children in local schools and daycare centers.
- On August 1, 2012 the library began offering its Book-A-Librarian program to provide one-on-one personalized computer help or research assistance. Patrons receive a one-hour training session by scheduling at least one day in advance.

In 2012 the City continued its membership in the Polk County Economic and Industrial Development Corporation with a \$5,000 contribution for annual dues.

A number of renovations of vacant properties and new construction projects in the Main Street downtown district as well as along Business 59 (North Washington Avenue) were undertaken in 2012 with the following projects completed or currently underway:

- Provident Memory Care, a new Alzheimer's facility, opened in April on Business 59.
- Valero/Rite Track convenience store/gas station opened in June on Business 59.
- Donut Xpress opened in November in the downtown business district.
- Skate Station roller rink and party place opened in October on Business 59.
- Polk County Dental Care office opened in September on Business 59.
- The Donut Factory opened in January 2013 on Business 59.
- McClendon's office building is scheduled to open in early 2013 on Business 59.

Economic Development

Livingston Main Street

The Main Street Program continued toward its goal of restoring and revitalizing downtown Livingston. Over \$750,000 of private money was invested in the Main Street District in 2012, and over \$13,000 was distributed to downtown businesses and building owners through the Main Street Reimbursement Grant Program. Local fundraisers and donations are the sole source of revenue for these reimbursement grants. Livingston Main Street receives no money from the state or federal governments.

- Main Street purchased 100 new Independence Day, Fall and Spring Banners to be displayed in the downtown area throughout the year. The City Electric Department is in charge of the installation of these banners.
- Main Street provided and maintained the Christmas lighting on the buildings in the downtown area. In 2012 over 500 feet of new lighting was added.
- Independence Day 2012 was celebrated downtown with the "Picnic in the Park" event. Anniversary Park was surrounded by motorcycles and classic cars. Attendees listened to a live band playing patriotic music as they ate free hot dogs provided by Main Street and served by the F.A.I.T.H. Military Support Group. The event captured the feel of a bygone era of small-town patriotism.

- In October HEB Grocery Store provided over 100 pumpkins to Main Street for volunteers to distribute throughout the downtown area as fall decorations.
- The Sixth Annual Main Street Downtown Trash & Treasure Garage Sale was held in November. This event grows each year and is becoming more of a festival with over 50 food and arts and crafts vendors participating in 2012.
- Livingston Main Street joined with all City departments to host the Hometown Christmas Festival in December. This event, attended by more than 11,000 during the day, was spectacular because of the good weather and a fantastic lighted parade.
- The Ogden Country Jubilee "Branson Style" show was presented in February and August. This sell-out event attracted more than 1,000 people and is Main Street's premier fundraiser.
- On Friday, October 26, 2012 Union Pacific Steam Locomotive No. 844 stopped in downtown Livingston on its way to Houston to celebrate Union Pacific's 150th Anniversary.




Police Department



The department purchased one new patrol car to replace an older patrol unit taken out of service. Received in February 2012, PD Unit #6 Caprice was put into service.

- The Police Department, along with officers from other area law enforcement agencies, again competed in a basketball competition with the “Go Getters”, the Livingston Special Olympics Basketball Team. The law enforcement team was once again defeated.
- The Livingston Police Department's Caran Coward Memorial Scholarship was awarded to four graduating seniors from Livingston High School. Scholarships were presented by Officer Chad Lilley. Department employees raised funds for the scholarships by selling barbecue sandwiches.
- The City Council approved the purchase of tasers for the Livingston Police Department and provided training and certification for the officers in the use of tasers.

Livingston Volunteer Fire Department

The Livingston Volunteer Fire Department provides Livingston and the surrounding area with fire prevention, fire protection, medical first responders, rescue operations and hazardous material responses. The Department covers 250 square miles of property in its initial response area. The Department also provides mutual aid to the other ten departments in Polk County. In 2012, the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department responded to 613 calls for service.

- The City of Livingston Fire Marshal's office conducted annual fire safety inspections and pre-fire planning in commercial buildings. During 2012, 249 commercial buildings were inspected.

- In February, the Department held its annual fire training school, attended by over 400 students and instructors from over 95 different fire departments throughout Texas.
- Throughout the year, the members of the Department attended training at various locations to meet their continuing education requirements. The Department also provided fire prevention and fire safety programs to schools, civic groups and service organizations throughout the County.

Parks and Recreation Department

Pedigo Park was the site for several community events, including the annual Polk County Relay for Life for the American Cancer Society, Rotary Free Family Movie Night, the Polk County Fit City Challenge 5K Fun Run, Girl Scout Group 5765 Cruising 4 Fun community service event and the First Baptist Church "A Night in Bethlehem."

- The City's Matthews Park Swimming Pool offered a summer full of activities, with swimming lessons for over 350 children including Water Babies, Water Waddles for 3-year-olds and regular lessons for children 4 years old and older.
- The Volunteer Appreciation Dinner was held in April with the theme "Volunteers-Our Greatest Natural Resource." Without its volunteers, the Parks and Recreation Department would be unable to host the many special events and youth sports leagues throughout the year.
- The Parks and Recreation Department created a wide array of special Christmas lighting throughout the City. New displays for 2012 included the jungle animal displays and the tunnel of lights at Pedigo Park.





Trade Days / Special Events

Trade Days completed its 13th year of operation with an average of 150 vendors attending each monthly event. Advertising efforts attracted vendors from as close as our hometown of Livingston to as far away as Wisconsin, Utah, South Dakota, Montana, Arizona, Illinois, California, Minnesota and Iowa.

- Trade Days special events included the 11th Annual Spring Outdoor Expo in March, the Texas Pioneer Bird Show in May, the Christmas In July event in July, and the annual Dog Show in November. Trade Days hosted two vendor appreciation events: a Hot Dog Supper in August and the Thanksgiving Potluck Dinner in November.
- The City's 13th annual "Easter Eggstravaganza" drew large crowds of children hunting for more than 20,000 Easter eggs stuffed with candy and prize tokens. Local businesses donated candy and more than 200 prizes, including bicycles, tricycles, swimming pools, sports equipment, Easter baskets, stuffed animals, electronic toys and learning games.



- The annual Kids Fishing Frenzie tournament was held in April for children from toddlers to age 17. The event promoted an interest in fishing. The Texas Game Wardens Association stocked Pedigo Park Pond with catfish; other sponsors included C.H. Marine, First National Bank, First State Bank, Walmart and the V.F.W.
- The annual Hometown Christmas celebration attracted many visitors. The Jingle Bell Fun Run included 258 walkers and runners, many in costume. Vendors, a petting zoo and carriage rides were popular attractions surrounding City Hall. The Train Village was popular throughout the month of December. The Hometown Christmas event concluded with a lighted evening parade and visits with Santa at City Hall.





Electric Department

- Maintained lights at Livingston Municipal Airport, tennis courts, baseball fields, Murphy Memorial Library, and fire training field.
- Cut more than 225 dead trees that were near high voltage power lines or other City facilities.
- Added three new street lights to West Park Drive.
- A new Altec TA 60 bucket truck was put in service. The electric crew decorated the new truck and drove it in the annual lighted Christmas parade.
- Built one span of overhead primary and one span of underground primary with padmount transformer to serve the newly renovated Dunbar Gym.
- Installed polemount transformer and overhead service for the new traffic signals at the intersection of N. Washington and N. Houston.



- Assisted in the Electrical Safety Training at the annual Livingston Volunteer Fire Department Fire School.
- Continued mowing of rights-of-way throughout the City.
- Replaced old light fixtures on the south end of the Rodeo Arena and also all of the fixtures underneath the covered shed on the east side of the Arena and installed electric service to the portable building at the Rodeo Arena for the Trinity Neches Livestock Show office.
- Performed routine maintenance of both Livingston and Ogletree electric substations and installed insulating materials on bushings in both substations.

Water and Wastewater Department

- The annual Sanitary Sewer Evaluation Study was completed on schedule with corrections of direct storm water inflow into the sanitary sewer system as research and data collection required.
- Continued with fire hydrant maintenance and replacement throughout town.

- Continued with upgrades to the water distribution system in various parts of town.
- Completed installation of generators on 14 lift station sites and the installation of new debris diversion equipment at the wastewater treatment plant, funded with Hurricane Ike Disaster grant funds.

Street Department

- Ditch maintenance and drainage improvements were made throughout the city.
- Sign maintenance and signage improvements were made throughout the city and retro-reflective stop signs were installed.
- The rehabilitation of dirt streets and paved streets continued with the installation of more than 15,000 square yards of seal coat to various streets throughout the city.
- Made drainage improvements at the Little League ball fields and rodeo/fairgrounds.
- Continued the brush collection program picking up vegetative debris and brush once a month in each quadrant of the city.



Garage Department

- Maintained 33 generators that supply electricity to various city facilities during power outages.
- Maintained and repaired more than 135 pieces of equipment/vehicles used by all city departments.
- Maintained fuel supply and fuel operations at Livingston Municipal Airport.
- Fabricated and repaired specialty tools for all city departments.
- Installed emergency lighting, radios and other equipment in new service vehicles.


