## A MESSAGE FROM OUR MAYOR

As Mayor of the City of Livingston, and on behalf of the City Council, it is my privilege to report to you on the operation of our city during the past year. We are always moving forward. We made history in 2018 when I was named as Livingston's first female Mayor. Part of my job is to present the 2018 Annual Report to the People which recaps the important projects and activities that the City undertook last year, and I am pleased to do so.

Following the death of long time City Manager Marilyn Sutton, the City Council hired Billy S. Wiggins as her replacement. Bill is a lifelong resident of Livingston and he is doing a remarkable job. He is leading our 81 full-time and two regular part-time dedicated employees and they are providing us with the same quality services to which we have grown accustomed. Bill had 'on the job' training and he works easily with all of the staff as well as the many


dedicated volunteers that keep many programs going in our city. We also have volunteers who work with our youth on projects such as the baseball fields, softball fields, soccer fields, football fields and rodeo arena. We are fortunate to have many volunteers who work tirelessly on our community events such as the Easter Eggstravaganza, and our Hometown Christmas events, such as the Jingle Bell Fun Run and the lighted Christmas parade.

We were able to complete the installation of a second electrical transformer in the Livingston Substation, which will give us much needed capacity to handle future growth. We also installed an irrigation system at the Municipal Golf Course. We installed an 8" water line to complete a water loop off Old Woodville Road which will increase water quality and pressure in the Northeast quadrant of the City.

We also dedicated a Welcome Sign at the corner of US Hwy 59 Loop and Hwy 190 to the memory of Marilyn Sutton. There is a plaque which quotes her as saying "Livingston, a Great Place to Call Home."

I am pleased that our staff practices good Customer Service. I sincerely appreciate the hard and efficient work of our City of Livingston staff and employees. Your dedication and commitment do not go unnoticed. It is an honor for me to serve as your Mayor along with the City Council who serves tirelessly without compensation. We are proud to be a part of this city which is "A Great Place to Call Home".

## CITY COUNCIL & ADMINISTRATION

The 'Welcome to Livingston' sign was dedicated in memory of Marilyn Sutton, former City Manager of Livingston.

Retiring Mayor Clarke Evans was honored at a ceremony on May 17, 2018 and presented with a custom-made belt buckle honoring his ten years of service as Mayor of the City of Livingston. His photo was added to the photo display of former mayors located at City Hall.

The City Secretary furnished a Certificate of Unopposed Candidates confirming that Alderwoman Cochran for the office of Mayor, Alderman Alan Cook and Alderman Marion 'Bid' Smith for the office of Alderman were unopposed for election to office for the election to be held on May 5, 2018. Council approved Ordinance No. A-806 cancelling the May 5, 2018 General Election and declaring each unopposed candidate elected to office.

Alderman Elgin Davis was reappointed to serve on the Deep East Texas Council of Governments Board of Directors for the term 7/1/18 - 6/30/19.

Council approved the payment of \$4,200.00 as the City of Livingston's pro-rata share of the annual funding of the Brazos Transit District service.

At the special-called May 15, 2018 Council meeting, the City Secretary administered oaths of office and presented Certificates of Election to Mayor Judy Cochran, Alderman Alan Cook and Alderman Marion 'Bid' Smith. Alderman Cook was nominated to serve as Mayor Pro-tem for the 2018-2019 term.

Council approved the extension of the existing contract with Santek Waste Services for the collection and disposal of solid waste services within the city limits for an additional 5-year period from August, 2018 through August, 2023.

Former Mayor Clarke Evans was appointed as Alderman on June 12, 2018 to fill the vacancy that was created when Mayor Judy Cochran took office on May 15, 2018. Alderman Evans will serve the remainder of the term through May, 2019.

Council presented Certificates of Appreciation to 10 local churches for their participation in the annual RISE UP! Serve Together Day of Service. This tremendous event included members of several local congregations giving of their time and talents to provide community service project assistance to the City of Livingston numerous school districts, non-profit service organizations, and elderly citizens in our area.



# COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Josh Mohler, Fire Marshal/Code Enforcement Officer, continued to work on a city-wide cleanup of junked vehicles, dilapidated buildings and illegal dumping.

The Polk County Adult Probation Department assisted with litter collection with community service work days.

The City Manager was appointed as hearing officer to conduct hearings on junk vehicle abatement matters including junked vehicles, water craft and aircraft as included in the City's Code of Ordinances.

Community Development Coordinator Ben Buchanan retired from the City in June, 2018. Jeff Hunter transitioned to Community Development Coordinator from Water/Wastewater Compliance Coordinator and continues to perform well in his new department.

The Community Development Department conducted 392 inspections during 2018.

## LIVINGSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

Escorted and assisted with traffic control for several parades and events throughout the year including the Dunbar Alumni Association Parade, Livingston ISD Homecoming Parade, the Spirit Ride bicycle event, the Jingle Bell Fun Run/Walk and the annual lighted Christmas Parade.

In April, Livingston Police Department participated in the Goodrich I.S.D. Career Day.

The Livingston Police Department presented six graduating seniors with the Caran Coward Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship funds were raised by department employees at the annual barbecue lunch. In addition, Robert Smith made a donation to the Caran Coward Memorial Scholarship fund after challenging the department to do a lip-sync video. Several department members participated in the video and the proceeds went to the Caran Coward Memorial Scholarship fund.



The Livingston Police Department presented public safety programs to various civic organizations in the community.

Officers Kevin Ward, Kaleb Barker, Scott Paske and Ronnie Bogany visited the kindergarten and pre-K classes at Cedar Grove Elementary.

The Livingston Police Department celebrated National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week in April and expressed appreciation for the dedication and professionalism of the department's personnel.

Attended training throughout the year including legal update training and intermediate Spanish.

The Polk County Home School groups toured the police department and had a close up view of the police vehicles.



Detective Marty Drake provided SAAFE House with an informational program on active shooter drills and steps to take in a crisis. The presentation was held at First Baptist Church.



Livingston Police Department partnered with the Texas Department of Public Safety and Walmart for the annual "Shop with a Cop" event where several local children were treated to breakfast with the officers before going on a shopping spree.



# LIVINGSTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Livingston Volunteer Fire Department provides Livingston and the surrounding area with fire prevention, fire protection, medical first responders, rescue operations and hazardous material responses. The Department covers 250 square miles of property in its initial response area. The Department also provides mutual aid to the other ten departments in Polk County. In 2018, the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department responded to 631 calls for service, including 296 inside the City and 335 outside the City.

In February, the Department had to cancel its annual fire training school due to heavy rain and threat of flooding throughout the region.

The City Council approved the renewal of the annual agreement with Polk County for firefighting services to be provided by the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department outside the City limits from October 1, 2018 through September 30, 2019, reflecting funding of \$41,313.82 by the County.



Throughout the year, members of the Department attended training at various locations to meet their continuing education requirements; the Department also provided fire prevention and fire safety programs to schools, civic groups and organizations throughout the County.

In October, 2018 Livingston ISD honored Livingston VFD Fire Chief Corky Cochran, a LISD Class of 1964 graduate, with the dedication of the Corky Cochran Track and Soccer Complex for his selfless dedication to the community.

## LIVINGSTON MUNICIPAL LIBRARY

Livingston Municipal Library, located at the corner of Tyler and Milam Streets, continued with a very busy year in 2018. The Livingston Municipal Library hosted 131 programs for children, 92 adult programs and 16 young adult programs. Genealogy workshops and Tech Tuesdays continued during 2018. These exciting educational programs were attended by 3,569 people.

The Friends of the Library provided funds to purchase large print books, children's books and the Houston Chronicle as well as \$1,500 to allow the library to continue membership with the Piney Woods Digital Consortium. In addition, the Friends of the Library provided prizes for the summer reading program and funds for special programs. The Friends of the Library hosted two book sales in their space on the second floor.

The 'Libraries Rock' summer reading program provided programs for children, including Storytime for preschoolers, Toddler Time for infants and toddlers, and Baby and Me lap sit program. The library hosted 'Animals Rock' with Lucas Miller the singing zoologist, 'Read, Rock and Roll' with Sue Young featuring musical activities, 'Reading Rocks with Socks and Fox' with Julian Franklin, and a Future Authors

Workshop. Johnny Villarreal and the Edge of Imagination Station offered kids the opportunity to create a music video during the two-day workshop.

The Sons of Confederate Veterans Ike Turner Chapter #1275 presented 'A Day in History' at the Library including hands-on displays of muskets, uniforms and artifacts from the Civil War.

The three community meeting rooms were utilized throughout the year to provide informational programs including Cigna Health, Gentiva Hospice, Harbor Hospice, Healthy Livingston, La Leche League of Livingston, Live Crescendo, Polk County Historical Commission, Road Rules Driving Academy, the DAR Robert Rankin Chapter, Sons of Confederate Veterans Ike Turner Chapter, Polk County Retired Teachers Association, and United Daughters of the Confederacy Ike Turner Chapter. Classes held at the Library included diabetes education, quilting, crochet, sewing, yoga, Tai Chi and card making.

Special events hosted by the library included Beginner Beekeeping in Texas, International Talk Like a Pirate Day, the 2019 Texas Writers Exhibit, Harvest Celebration, and 'Stories

for a Dark and Stormy Night' interactive program presented by Bernadette Nason.

In July the Library presented 'The Treasures of Tutankhamun' -- an exhibit by Humanities Texas, the state affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The Library partnered with Texas Children's Health Plan to host the annual Back-to-School Fair.

In October 2018, the Livingston Municipal Library was awarded a \$10,500 grant from the Hancher Library Foundation to support its "Transformer Tech Training" project. The goal of the project is to strengthen tech and digital literacy training in the library.

On October 31st the Library hosted a 'Book or Treat' event, a family-friendly celebration including a costume contest and book giveaway.

During 2018 a total of 50,604 customers entered the library.

## LIVINGSTON MAIN STREET

Livingston Main Street continues to help revitalize downtown Livingston. Main Street has distributed nearly \$200,000 in reimbursement grant funds to downtown business and building owners since 2005. All of this money has been raised by local fundraisers – the program receives no federal or state financial assistance.

Members of the Main Street Advisory Board are Julie Mayes Hambrick, Tammi Ogletree, Jeremy Buie, Debbie Cooper, Kevan Wood, Molly Anderson, Kim Brown, Julee Evans and Hannah Williams.

Main Street partnered with the F.A.I.T.H Military Support Group for the 7th annual Independence Day "Picnic in the Park". Unfortunately the event had to be cancelled due to weather.

Main Street works with the Polk County Museum, the Polk County Historical Commission and the Historical Society in sharing newly found historical information and historic photographs.

Main Street is a member of the Livingston Specialty Merchants Guild, an organization comprised of local, independent businesses who promote the Livingston area.

Main Street hosted Market In The Park, an artisan and farmer's market held in Anniversary Park throughout the summer. The event featured local artists, fresh produce and baked goods, and live music. Plans are underway to continue the Market in 2019.

Main Street organized Shop Small Saturday on November 24, 2018. Held the Saturday after Black Friday, the event

encouraged people to purchase holiday items from local merchants. Shoppers picked up a Shop Small Passport from any one of the participating 14 business and received a sticker for each business they visited. Shoppers could then enter the grand prize drawing once they had visited at least five of the participating businesses. The grand prize winner won a basket of goodies valued at over \$250.

Main Street joined with all City departments to host Hometown Christmas. An estimated 10,000 people visited the downtown area to watch the Jingle Bell Fun Run and shop for food and gifts from vendors located along Jackson Street. Main Street oversees the vendor spaces and also provided space for the Livingston Quilt Club to display their creations. The lighted parade and visits with Santa ended a day of fun.

## ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT

Maintained lighting and electrical equipment at Livingston Municipal Complex, Livingston Municipal Airport, tennis courts, baseball fields, Livingston Municipal Library, Barney Wiggins Memorial Arena Fairgrounds, Matthews Street Park, LVFD fire training field and four LVFD fire stations. Maintained street lights, night lights and flood lights throughout the City.

Continued maintenance of rights-of-way throughout the City including mowing of vegetation, tree trimming and removal of dead or problem trees.

Performed routine maintenance of both Livingston and Ogletree electric substations. Sam Rayburn Municipal Power Agency replaced the second of two substation transformers at the Livingston substation.

Participated in the annual lighted Christmas parade with a float.

Crews set 13 new poles for new duplex houses being built on Brittany Lane and Trey Street.

Assisted with installation of Christmas lighted displays in Pedigo Park and Anniversary Park, the lighted chandelier at the intersection of Polk and Jackson and the pine cone pole decoration at Milam and Jackson.

Electric linemen participated in six safety meetings hosted by Texas Electric Cooperatives.

Converted overhead primary to underground primary at Bergman Tower to improve work zone safety for tower construction and dismantling of old tower.

Installed seasonal Welcome to Livingston banners and military appreciation banners throughout the year.

The City of Livingston Electric Department earned the American Public Power Association's Safety Award of Excellence for safe operating practices in 2018. The Electric Department earned the first-place award in the Group B category for utilities with 15,000 – 29,999 worker-hours of annual worker exposure.

### STREET DEPARTMENT

Ditch maintenance and drainage improvements were made throughout the city.

Sign maintenance and signage improvements were made throughout the city.

Continued the brush collection program picking up vegetative debris and brush once a month in each quadrant of the city.



### WATER AND WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT

Continued with fire hydrant maintenance and replacement throughout town.

Continued with upgrades to the water distribution system in various parts of town.

Continued sewer manhole rehabilitation lining approximately 17 manholes during the year.

Installation was completed on an irrigation system to serve the Livingston Municipal Golf Course.

Installed an 8" water line to complete a loop off Old Woodville Road to increase water quality and pressure in the Northeast quadrant of the City.



### GARAGE DEPARTMENT

Maintained 33 generators that supply electricity to various city facilities during power outages.

Maintained and repaired more than 135 pieces of equipment/vehicles used by all city departments.

Maintained fuel supply and fuel operations at Livingston Municipal Airport.

Fabricated and repaired specialty tools for all city departments.

Installed emergency lighting, radios and other equipment in new service vehicles.

## SPECIAL EVENTS / TRADE DAYS

Trade Days completed its 19th year of operation with an average of 150 vendors attending each monthly event. Advertising efforts attracted vendors from as close as our hometown of Livingston to as far away as Wisconsin, Utah, South Dakota, Montana, Arizona, Illinois, California, Minnesota and Iowa. Zip code information collected from shoppers showed visitors from Minnesota, Arkansas, Missouri, Montana, North Carolina, Wisconsin, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Florida, South Dakota, Ohio and all areas of Texas.

Trade Days, Parks and Recreation, and Livingston Main Street moved into the newly completed office located at the Pedigo Park entrance. A Grand Opening and Ribbon Cutting was held on April 24, 2018. The former office building was relocated within Pedigo Park and will continue to be in use.

Trade Days special events included the 17th Annual Spring Outdoor Expo in March and the Texas Pioneer Bird Show in



May. Trade Days hosted an Ice Cream Social for vendors in August and the Thanksgiving Potluck Dinner for vendors in November.

The City's 19th annual Easter Eggstravaganza included 20,000 Easter eggs stuffed with candy and prize numbers and hid at Pedigo Park for local youngsters to hunt. Local businesses donated candy, bicycles, tricycles, swimming pools, sports equipment, Easter baskets, stuffed animals, electronic toys, learning games and much more. Over 200 prizes were given away at this event. Generous sponsors and numerous volunteers make this event one of the highlights of the year.

This year, the Texas Game Warden Association, C.H. Marine, First National Bank, First State Bank and the City of Livingston sponsored the annual Kids Fishing Frenzie held in Pedigo Park. The fishing tournament is for children from toddlers to 16 years old to promote an interest in fishing. The Texas



Game Wardens Association stocked the pond with catfish to be sure there were plenty of fish for the youngsters to catch.

The 17th Annual Volunteer Appreciation Dinner was held in April with the theme "Volunteers Make The World A Brighter Place!" Without its volunteers, the City of Livingston would be unable to host the many special events and youth sports leagues throughout the year.

The annual Hometown Christmas celebration attracted many visitors. The Jingle Bell Fun Run included over 350 walkers and runners, many in costume. The Train Village was popular throughout the month of December. The Hometown Christmas event concluded with a lighted evening parade with nearly 100 parade entries. After the parade, Santa was at City Hall to visit with children and have pictures taken.

## PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Pedigo Park was the site for several community events, including the Polk County Relay for Life, First Baptist Church "A Night In Bethlehem" and the Christmas Hay Ride in the Park.

The 73rd Annual Trinity-Neches Livestock Show & Rodeo was held at the Barney Wiggins Memorial Rodeo Arena and included 4-H and FFA youth exhibitors from Livingston and Polk county. Events included a BBQ cook-off, livestock show, washer tournament, arts & crafts exhibits, food show, ag mechanics exhibits, horticulture exhibits, sweetheart contest, rodeo and livestock auction.

Matthews Park Swimming Pool offered a summer full of activities including swimming lessons for over 400 children,

including Water Babies, Water Waddles for 3-year-olds and regular swim lessons for children 4 years old and older.

The 58th Annual Polk County Youth Rodeo was held at the Barney Wiggins Memorial Rodeo Arena in July.

The Parks and Recreation Department created a wide array of special Christmas lighting throughout the City including new snowflakes and stars for utility poles around the City.

Numerous tournaments were hosted by Livingston Youth Baseball Association and Livingston Girls Softball Association bringing in many families to spend the weekend in Livingston.

In its third year of operation by Bobby Brame, the Livingston Municipal Golf Course continued to offer 9 challenging holes with three tee options and programs for men, women and children.


